

Our orchestra conductor search committee has been working to identify strong candidates to fill the permanent role. This season, each concert will feature a different guest conductor. Tonight, we are excited to welcome Scott Betts to the podium.

In July, the club awarded the VSA a whopping \$5,000!

VSA SEASON 50 RECAP & GRATITUDE REPORT

As of August 8, 2022

VSA patrons, friends and musician members:

Thank you all for your support during our Jubilee Season. It was filled with challenges and celebrations. Important milestones occurred in our 50th Season. We said "farewell" to two longtime friends: VSA Orchestra Conductor Michael J. Kern retired after devoting 27 years to the growth of the orchestra and the organization; Debra TenNapel, concertmaster since 2008, resigned to move with her family to Montana. We said "hello" to our new chorus director. Katv Kristoffersen.

The VSA Orchestra and Chorus presented 6 programs with a total of 10 performances. Over 3,700 concert-goers enjoyed the talents of 111 musicians. Musicians attended over 60 rehearsals. Patrons, underwriters, partners, and sponsors totaled more than 139.

Total revenues, including in-kind partnerships and donations, were \$153,987. Total expenses, including in-kind partnerships, were \$138.538. Major in-kind income included broadcast advertising from Cherry Creek Media (\$23k+), venues provided by the City of Montrose (\$7k+), newsprint advertising in the Montrose Daily Press & Delta County Independent (\$7,500), mobile billboard advertising by Alpine Bank (\$5k), and large format

VSA SEASON 50 RECAP & GRATITUDE REPORT cont...

Season 51 begins with *Pops in the Park* on Saturday, September 10. This concert will be presented at the new Montrose Rotary Amphitheater and guest conducted by Scott Betts, well-known area conductor and performer. The season continues with *Christmas by Candlelight, Young Composers*, and *Pop Stars & Superheroes*, all with performances on Saturdays and Sundays at the Montrose Pavilion.

The quarterly schedule was adopted for Season 51 to allow the board, consultants, and volunteers to most effectively focus their efforts, responsibly and efficiently steward the organization, and continue to recover from COVID challenges and setbacks. Season 52 is scheduled to resume a six-concert season.

The Conductor Selection Committee, chaired by Charles Latshaw (music director/conductor of the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra), received applications through July 1; have reviewed applications and are currently holding interviews for a new orchestra conductor.

Vince Snowbarger joined the board in June. Our thanks to past board members Eunice Acker and Brenda Anderson, who finished their terms in 2021.

Season 51's budget is similar to Season 50 with total revenues anticipated at approximately \$95,000. Key supporters include: Townsquare Media (formerly Cherry Creek Media), Cimarron Wealth Management (formally Colorado West Investments), the City of Montrose, Montrose Daily Press/Delta County Independent, Alpine Bank, TEI Rock Drills, and GoBigBanners.

Ticket outlets are confirmed in Delta and Montrose. Our website can be conveniently used for donations as well as purchasing all VSA products, including tickets, advertising, sponsorships, partnerships, and underwriting.

Thank you for your support in making the VSA's vision, Bringing Classical Music to Life, a vital part of the Uncompandere, Grand, and North Fork Valley communities. With your help, volunteer musicians and audiences of all ages can look forward to another 50 years of great music.

Scott Betts Orchestra Guest Conductor

Scott Betts is a long-time music educator, clinician, and judge, and has conducted the High Desert Opera since 2008. From 1994 to 1995, he served as the president of the Colorado Chapter of the American String Teachers Association (ASTA) and has also been a member of the Colorado Instrumental Affairs Council.

Betts was also a member of the task force that wrote the Colorado Music Content Area Standards. He was

recognized for outstanding service to string music in 1996 by the Colorado Chapter of the ASTA. In the late '80s he was a guest artist with the VSA, singing and playing with his group, Hot Tub Jazz. He's a trumpeter with the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra and performs instrumentally and vocally with many regional music groups.

"The VSA has so much to offer listeners of all ages; I hope to see lots of people come out to support these musicians and enjoy the show in this

beautiful new space," Betts said. "The VSA is a solid regional orchestra. It'll be fun to work with this unique and special group that's been bringing music to life on the Western Slope for over 50 years—I can't wait to take them for a spin!"

SANDRA SUNDSTROM Concertmaster


Sandy grew up in Colorado Springs, CO, in a family of musicians. She was involved in orchestras, choirs, and bands throughout her youth, and earned her bachelor of music in education with an instrumental major and choral minor from Arizona State University. Sandy has taught band, choir, and orchestra in all levels of education, elementary through college.

In 2010, she and her family moved to Grand Junction. Sandy is a violinist with the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra (GJSO), High Desert Opera, and Rockestra, and has an active private studio teaching violin, viola, and cello. Her quartet performs in churches and for area events, and she plays in regional gigs, performs regularly in Aspen for summer weddings, and is a recurring violin coach for Camp Con Brio. Sandy adjudicates for the District 51 Solo/Ensemble, and local auditions, and judged the Colorado West Invitational Music Festival in 2013. She was an active member of the GJSO Board for many years and served on their music director search committee.

In 2013, she started as a paraprofessional in Mesa County School District. Sandy assists orchestras at several middle schools, and in 2014, she was a long-term sub for choirs at a local high school.

Sandy and her husband have two daughters, a son, and three grandchildren. They absolutely love living in Grand Junction: the people, surrounding views, and connections they've made.

What is a concertmaster? The concertmaster is the principal or "first chair" violinist who leads the orchestra in its tuning prior to the concert and customarily plays all violin solos within pieces. The concertmaster also marks the orchestra's scores with the appropriate bowings to ensure all the violinists are moving and playing in unison, offers suggestions to other string sections, and translates instructions from the conductor into specific technical language for strings.

OUR HISTORY: BRINGING CLASSICAL MUSIC TO LIFE!

In 1970 a small group of classical musicians met in the parlor of Wilma and Charles Lowell's Eckert home. By 1982, there were 30 musicians practicing once a week in Delta and performing four annual concerts. Over the years, the group has progressed, growing in size and musical ability.

In the late 1990s and early 2000s, the Grand Mesa Singers and the Christmas in the Valley Chorus were seasonal contributors, mainly at Christmas concerts. In 2002, these choral groups combined, and the Valley Symphony Orchestra (VSO) became the Valley Symphony Association (VSA) to include both orchestra and chorus.

Today, the VSA's 60+ instrumentalists and 35+ vocalists hail from throughout the North Fork, Uncompanier, and Grand Valleys.

The VSA takes pride in their history of bringing classical music to life on the Western Slope, their commitment to keeping classical music vital, and their goal of building future audiences.



WHO ARE OUR MUSICIANS?

They are teachers, parents, neighbors, students. They have jobs. They

have children. They have homes and schedules and commitments. They teach at local colleges, high schools, middle schools, and elementary schools. They work in business, the arts, government, agriculture, law enforcement, and health care. Some are retired. Some are entrepreneurs. Some are military veterans. They represent the Uncompahgre, Grand, and North Fork Valleys and live in Montrose, Ouray, Hotchkiss, Eckert, Olathe, Palisade, Paonia, Delta, Ridgway, Austin, Cedaredge, and Grand Junction. Some of them are snowbirds. Some of them are teenagers. And they are all VSA musicians.



FEATURED MUSICIAN Lois Drysdale - Violin 2

Lois grew up in Fort Morgan, CO. In the fourth grade, she started playing the piano and violin. "My Dad said that, if I got good enough, we could move the piano from my bedroom into the living room."

She did get good enough and the piano was relocated. She played at church and was her mother's accompanist when she sang. In school Lois played the violin in the orchestra and in a traveling string quartet. Her family moved to Montrose when she was 13. "Much to my disagnitude of the control of the control

moved to Montrose when she was 13. "Much to my disappointment there was only a band in high school—no orchestra." She took up the oboe so she could have some music in her life. "Don't ask me to play it now, as I would not know where to start!"

Lois has lived in the area for 55 years, the last 18 in Delta. She's worked for the Montrose School District for 28 years. She loves to read and fly fish, and lives a content, peaceful, and mostly drama-free life.

When Lois' niece told her she wanted to learn to play, Lois lent her violin. Sadly, her niece's husband sold it. "So, I went a long time without a violin."

Her husband, Leroy, knew how much she missed it and "When I turned 51, he bought me a violin!" Lois started taking lessons, "...to get back what I had lost for so many years." Her violin teacher gave her and Leroy tickets to see the VSA, and Lois was hooked. She joined the VSA Orchestra in 2011.

"One cannot describe the joy you get playing music with an ensemble like the VSA. Sometimes it still gives me chills. I look forward to playing more music, to learning more, and sharing with everyone."

FEATURED MUSICIAN Demeris York - Soprano 2



Demeris York began singing as a small child when her parents discovered she had a real talent for music. They enrolled her in voice and piano lessons, which she loved. She sang all through her childhood and during high school where she was involved in musical theatre. She attended the University of Northern Colorado on a music scholarship where she minored in music. After graduation, she sang with the Denver Symphony Orchestra and Chorus, where she was fortunate enough

to learn from and sing with a variety of international conductors from many different cultures.

Demeris was an educator in Douglas County and lived in Parker, CO, for 27 years. During that time, she sang in several church groups and taught voice lessons. She then took a few years off from music to raise her two young children. Once they were a little older, she came back to her music by teaching voice and guitar lessons.

DISCOVERING OUR ROOTS

Volunteer orchestral and choral groups like the VSA are an outcropping from the concept of the American community band, which predates the Civil War. Immigrants brought the band tradition with them to the US, where thousands of ordinary citizens participated in these ensembles.

After the Civil War, census figures indicated that, across the country, there were about 10,000 community bands. Town bands were admired and provided townspeople with popular, light entertainment for concerts. While the quality of performance varied, the enjoyment and value to each town's social and cultural climate is undeniable.

Community bands experienced a great dying out after World War I, victims of a cultural shift to mass media, radio, and more, all which led to a rise in school music programs. The increased number of musicians who learned an instrument and played in high school and college bands but did not pursue music as a career also provided a rich pool of amateur talent seeking an outlet for their musical abilities. As a result—and ironically—there was once again a rise in participation in community bands.

While there will always be music teachers and professional musicians participating in volunteer music performance groups like the VSA, the majority of members come from professions that are not related to music. Most are amateurs who enjoyed playing in school and missed the camaraderie and music-making. Others are students looking to gain more rehearsal time and learn from more experienced musicians.

These ensembles give *everyone*, regardless of their age or chosen career path, a place to play their instrument, contribute to their community, and most especially, to enjoy themselves while making music.
