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FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Welcome to Season 53! We are so excited that you've joined us for this season's playful, fun concerts.

The past few years have been marked by a great deal of change for the Valley Symphony Association. The 2020 pandemic changed how we think about and value live music experiences and interrupted our 50th season, deferring most of it by a year and relegating us to backyard jam sessions and masked-up chamber music. During

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our first hesitant season back, we said hello to our energetic new Chorus Conductor Katy Kristoffersen and promoted Stacey Ryan as our Communications and Development Director. We also said farewell to both our beloved conductor of over 25 years, Mike Kern, and our fearless concertmaster of over 10 years, Debra TenNapel.

As we undertook our artistic director search during Season 51, the orchestra and chorus both worked under four different guest conductors, which taught us a great deal about our organizational identity and what the future of the VSA could look like. This unexpected gift of perspective initiated a period of deep reflection on what makes us essential to our musicians and audiences. Coming out of this transitional year, we decided to lean into our roots as a locally-focused, multi-community, grassroots organization and concentrate on building the infrastructure needed to sustain our programs and express our love for the music we share for generations to come.

Last season, we welcomed Mr. Troy Raper as our new artistic director and orchestra conductor, whose artistic vision has given us the joyful, exuberant themes for this season's concerts. We also bade farewell to the two longest-standing board members in our history, Priscilla Fry and Hartland Clubb, and welcomed five new board members to the fold: Cheryl Zahniser, Cathy Hoffman, Nona Mayberry, Anne Harper, and Glen Justis. Over the summer, while our musicians took a break, our board hired our first executive director in many years (yours truly) and held our first ever day-long board retreat to determine the direction of the VSA for the next five years.

We're extremely excited to share with you our new mission and vision statements, as well as our inspiring artistic vision and strategic plan for the next five years. Group music-making, like the performance you are watching today, has a unique ability to create community and connect people across all kinds of differences and boundaries. The VSA has been blessed with the opportunity to bring people together like this in our community for over 50 years, and we can't wait to do it for 50 more!

The musicians you see on stage tonight are the core of our community. Our musicians come from over a dozen different communities on the Western

Slope of Colorado, and they are all volunteers. For each concert, the collective time spent practicing, rehearsing, assisting with logistics, and performing by all members of each ensemble represents over 2,000 volunteer hours. For performances where both ensembles are performing, that number doubles for a staggering 4,000+ human hours to create the performance you are seeing onstage. For the roughly 120 people who participate in our chorus and orchestra, our music and community are a significant part of their lives. Their individual, personal investment in community music-making is the reason the VSA exists.

But they can't do it alone. Without music stands, chairs, sheet music, risers, practice space, marketing, pay for our conductors and staff, ticketing software, a website, and many other elements, the best we'd be able to do is go back to those Covid-era jam sessions in someone's backyard. Creating large performances in beautiful spaces costs time and money outside of our musicians' dedicated volunteer hours. That's where our wonderful board members, staff, donors, sponsors, underwriters, partners, and non-musician volunteers step in to support our community. As you look through this program, take note of the myriad of businesses, individuals, and organizations who enthusiastically support the VSA, and see if you can support any of them in turn. If you are interested in supporting us as a board member, musician, volunteer, committee member, sponsor, underwriter, or partner, please reach out! It takes a village, and we are lucky to have a very large, supportive, enthusiastic village here on the Western Slope.

And lastly, none of this would have any meaning without you, our audience. Performances differ from rehearsals in that they create a loop of excitement and connection between the composers, the musicians on stage, and the observers in the audience that unifies us all in a timeless expression of the human experience. All of those volunteer hours and resources are going towards creating a moment in time that is meant to be shared. Whether you came tonight to support a friend onstage, listen to a composer or song that you love, create a memory with your family, or just be in this space and experience human connection on a grand scale, you are an essential part of our mission and our community. Thank you for being here and undertaking this journey with us!

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
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

Stephanie took her first violin lesson in 1997 at age 5 from former VSA Concertmaster Lu Vorys and has loved music ever since. In 1998, Stephanie joined what would become the Valley Youth Orchestra, playing chamber music in a dirt-floor cabin in Paonia. She consistently performed with the VYO and VSA until graduating from high school in 2010, after which she earned two bachelors degrees, one in music and one in anthropology, from the University of Colorado Boulder. In 2019, she also earned a masters in arts

administration from Florida State University, where she studied under internationally recognized conductor André Thomas and Met Opera Soprano Marcy Stonikas. Her entire family regularly sings together, and her father and brother both play cello in the VSA Orchestra.

Among other adventures, Stephanie has founded the North Fork Community Choir, published original research on the acoustics of kivas at Mesa Verde National Park, worked at a humane society on Maui, and ran lighting and sound at the Sitka Music Festival in Alaska. She has served on three nonprofit boards, founded four organizations, and worked with more than a dozen nonprofits in positions ranging from intern to executive director.

Currently, Stephanie is the Program Manager for Performing and Literary Arts in Crested Butte, CO. She also teaches the strings program at Western Colorado University, directs the North Fork Community Choir, and maintains a small studio of string and piano students.

When not working or making music with family, Stephanie can be found kayaking down the Gunnison, exploring new flavors in the kitchen, or brushing up on her Hawaiian. Please find her after a concert and say hello!

STACEY RYAN DIRECTOR OF COMMUNICATIONS & DEVELOPMENT



A dedicated volunteer musician with the VSA Orchestra since 2010, Stacey's commitment and passion were recognized in 2018 when the VSA Board enlisted her for freelance marketing duties.

Her flair for fundraising, expertise in communications, and extensive knowledge in strategic management quickly became evident. Stacey's background in nonprofits, municipalities, and small businesses, combined with her personal and professional connections in the region, led to a significant expansion of her role. Her proficiency and versatility have since elevated her to the position of director of communications and development.

In this role, Stacey plays a pivotal part in achieving the VSA's goals of financial sustainability and fostering strong community relationships. 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

TROY RAPER Artistic Director and Orchestra Conductor Musician, educator, and Colorado native Troy Raper began his teaching career in 1988 and retired from Mesa County Valley School District #51 in 2022 after

31 years in education. He holds a bachelor's degree in music education from the University of Northern Colorado, where he graduated with honors, and a master's degree in education from Leslev University with an emphasis in educational technology.

During his long career. Trov's school orchestras were consistently awarded superior ratings at music festivals from Palisade to Disneyland. Many former students are now accomplished professional teachers and performers around the country.

As an active advocate in Colorado for teaching, Troy spent 10 years as chair/board member for the Colorado All State Orchestra Governing Board. helping to create a new charter and direction for the organization. He has also served as a board member of the Colorado Chapter of the American String Teachers Association, and as a member of the Colorado Music Educators Association State Board. He currently serves as production manager and librarian to the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra (GJSO).

Troy is an accomplished musician with broad performing experience. He has played with the Greeley, Ft. Collins, Chevenne, Durango, and Crested Butte festival orchestras and sits as principal bassist for the GJSO. He performs regularly in various jazz bands, recording studios, and as a concert soloist.

His hobbies and personal interests include spending time with his family. His wife. Lori, is an accomplished professional artist and teacher, and their adult daughters. Mandolyn and Melody, both work in careers in music and teaching. He enjoys arranging music for strings, computer games, mountain biking, riding his motorcycle, and remodeling projects in his new home.

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


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Katy Kristoffersen

KATY KRISTOFFERSEN Chorus Conductor

Katy Kristoffersen's 20 years of experience in coaching, accompanying, conducting, and teaching are backed by undergraduate degrees in music and psychology (Miami University, OH) and a master's in music education (College of Mount St. Joseph).

Enamored of music from the start, at 2 she was reaching for the piano to emulate her talented older siblings. She started composing piano pieces at 4 and accompanying church choirs by 12.

As an undergrad, Katy had the great privilege of studying with Dr. Ethan Sperry, a world-renowned name in the choral and world-music spheres. He helped to draw out her confidence as an arranger and composer. Katy dated Mike Kristoffersen (bass) throughout college, which led to her accompanying every single string bass player in the university. She also caught the eye of bass professor, Dr. Steve Ullery, who requested that she accompany his recital as well as the great Edgar Meyer when he visited to teach a master class.

"Accompanist" is a good metaphor for Katy's skill set, although "joyful fork-lift" is apt, too. Katy thrives when in service of elevating people around her. This energy has drawn her to stretch her skills outward in several directions: through the lens of music (choral director, music director, private teacher, music educator, accompanist), and through the lens of mindfulness (teaching her original curriculum to corporate and government agencies, private coaching, and starting her own mindfulness course with Mike).

When not hopping from one responsibility to the next, you might find Katy and Mike trail running near their Ridgway home, hiking with their kids, or just sitting outside in the awe and beauty that drew them here in the first place.

SANDRA SUNDSTROM Concertmaster

Sandy grew up in Colorado Springs, CO, in a family of musicians. She was involved in orchestras, choirs, and bands throughout her youth, and earned her bachelor of music in education with an instrumental major and choral minor from Arizona State University. Sandy has taught band, choir, and orchestra in all levels of education, elementary through college.

In 2010, she and her family moved to Grand Junction, and she is the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra (GJSO) Principal Second Violinist. She also plays with

High Desert Opera and Rockestra. She has an active private studio teaching violin, viola, and cello, and her quartet performs in churches and for area events. She plays in regional gigs, performs regularly in Aspen for summer weddings, and is a recurring violin coach for Camp Con Brio. Sandy has adjudicated for the District 51 (D51) Solo/Ensemble, and local auditions, and judged the Colorado West Invitational Music Festival in 2013. She was an active member of the GJSO Board for many years and served on their music director search committee.

In 2013, she started as a paraprofessional in Mesa County School District. Sandy has assisted orchestras at several middle schools, and in 2014, she was a long-term sub for choirs at a local high school. She retired from D51 in the fall of 2023. Sandy and her husband, Dan, have two daughters, a son, and four grandchildren. They absolutely love living in Grand Junction: the people, surrounding views, and connections they've made.

What is a concertmaster? The concertmaster is the principal or "first chair" violinist who leads the orchestra in its tuning prior to the concert and customarily plays all violin solos within pieces. As the leader of the entire string section, the concertmaster also marks the orchestra's scores with the appropriate bowings to ensure all the strings are moving and playing in unison, and translates instructions from the conductor into specific technical language for strings.

Stalling's brilliant arrangements, which masterfully blended classical symphonic works with the whimsical world of animation. Since that time, the cartoon industry has undergone significant



evolution. The music, once heavily reliant on classical themes, is now often composed specifically for individual animated shorts, creating a unique auditory experience for each piece of content.

In recent years, the realms of video games and cartoons have merged musically, with composers drawing from symphonic traditions to craft new, exhilarating soundtracks. This fusion has elevated the role of music in both mediums, making it central to the emotional impact and overall experience. Hearing just a snippet of these compositions can transport you back to the nostalgia of Saturday mornings spent watching your favorite cartoons or the thrill of immersing yourself in a video game for the first time, with the volume cranked up and the soundtrack providing a rush of energy.

Our concert will open with one of the most iconic pieces in the history of animation, a work that holds a special place in the hearts of symphony

musicians and fans alike: *The Rabbit of Seville* (1950), directed by **Chuck Jones**. Video Games Live! has been instrumental in elevating the status of video game composers, showcasing their work in a concert setting that rivals the grandeur of classical music

performances. This concert series has introduced video game music to new audiences, helping it gain recognition within the broader music industry. The influence of these soundtracks extends beyond the games themselves, as they often play a critical role in shaping the player's emotional experience.

As we delve into the music of television production and video games, it's important to acknowledge the power of this music as a standalone art form. Even when separated from the visual content, the music remains compelling and evocative. Conversely, removing the music from a production can drastically alter the emotional response, sometimes to the point of distorting the intended impact. **Stalling**, one of the pioneers of this approach, was a



master at aligning music with on-screen action. He famously said, "I fit the music to the action. I watched the action of the cartoons and tried to make the music express what was happening. I always tried to use music as a sound effect as much as a

score. The music could help underscore a joke, or even be the joke itself."

Soundtracks

To complete our evening's program, we will perform the iconic *Hungarian* Rhapsody No. 2 by Franz Liszt, famously featured in The Cat Concerto (1946) by MGM. This piece is celebrated for its flawless synchronization between the music and the animation. The timing of every beat and flourish of the

Hungarian Rhapsody No. 2 with the movements of Tom and Jerry is a testament to the animators' and musicians' technical expertise. For this special performance, we will accompany the music with the original video, creating a unique and immersive experience for our audience.

We invite you to join us for a memorable evening of music, laughter, and nostalgia as we celebrate the 53rd season of the VSA with Laugh! Saturday Morning Soundtracks. This



event is sure to be a delightful journey through the music that has shaped the worlds of cartoons and video games, offering something for everyone to enjoy.

Symphonic Christmas concerts have long been a cherished tradition, seamlessly blending the rich history of classical music with the festive spirit that defines the holiday season. As classical music evolved, composers began to craft elaborate works specifically intended for Christmas, weaving together

sacred and secular themes to celebrate this special time of year. One of the most enduring examples of this tradition is **George Frideric** Handel's Messiah, composed in 1741. Although

Messiah is not solely a Christmas piece, its "Hallelujah Chorus" and other segments have become iconic symbols of the holiday, performed by choirs and orchestras around the world during the Christmas season.

The tradition of symphonic Christmas concerts grew exponentially in the 20th century, with a notable surge in orchestral arrangements of traditional Christmas carols and popular songs. Composers and arrangers, such as **Leroy Anderson**, played a pivotal role in shaping this tradition. **Anderson**'s *Sleigh*

- Ride (1948) is a quintessential example, embodying **Wonderland** the joyful, light-hearted spirit of the holidays and becoming a staple in Christmas concert repertoires. This piece, with its playful rhythms and evocative

use of orchestral colors, captures the essence of a wintry sleigh ride, complete with the sound of jingling sleigh bells and the crisp crack of a whip.

In addition to *Sleigh Ride*, **Anderson** contributed another significant work to the Christmas concert tradition with his *A Christmas Festival*.

Commissioned by **Arthur Fiedler** for the Boston Pops Orchestra in 1950, this medley was designed to serve as a grand and festive overture for the orchestra's Christmas concerts. **Fiedler**, known for his ability to bridge the gap between popular and classical music, wanted a piece that

would encapsulate the joy and warmth of the season, while also providing a sense of nostalgia through familiar carols. **Anderson**'s *A Christmas Festival* achieved this beautifully, seamlessly blending well-known Christmas carols such as "Joy to the World," "Deck the Halls," and "Silent Night" into a cohesive and uplifting orchestral work. Over the years, it has become one of **Anderson**'s most famous and enduring compositions, performed by orchestras around the globe during the holiday season.

This year, the VSA is thrilled to expand on this rich tradition with a special Saturday family matinee performance designed specifically for kids and families. This new performance will feature a shorter program tailored to younger audiences, along with interactive activities and special events for children. It's an opportunity for families to join in the VSA holiday tradition, making memories that will last a lifetime. In addition to this family-focused event, the VSA will also hold its traditional performances that evening and on Sunday, allowing audiences of all ages to experience the magic of symphonic Christmas music.

VALLEY YOUTH ORCHESTRA

The Valley Youth Orchestra (VYO) was founded in 1999 with a goal to bring orchestra music instruction and appreciation to Colorado's Western Slope. Since that time the VYO has served nearly 1,000 students under the leadership of five conductors: Tyme Mientka, Janice Walker, Kenneth Todd, Debra TenNapel, and Laura Payne. The VYO has an active board and volunteers who dedicate their passion and knowledge to increase the visibility and access to orchestra music in the region. The VYO offers three levels of ensembles for ages 7-19 and performs three major concerts a season. Young musicians come from Delta, Montrose, Ouray, and Mesa Counties. Educational outreach includes masterclasses and workshops, as well as Strings in Schools performances at area schools in December.

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Dive in and experience water's impact on our hearts, minds, and spirits Chorus and Valley Youth Chorus - Apr 26 & 27

The VSA Chorus is the "voice" of the VSA. And with our voices, we have the ability to tell stories and share music in a powerful, human way. This concert is about using our voices to tell the story of *WATER!* Our story of water is one of healing, movement, inspiration, love, and time. Composers and poets have

found inspiration from all forms of water, so I have tried to capture the breadth of what artists feel, see, and experience when they observe water.



Our concert covers the mythology of water in "Song of the Sea" and the fun "Wellerman Sea Shanty." We sing about the use of water as a medium for baptism, renewal, and healing in "Washing of the Water," "Who Knows, Who Cares," and "Wade in the Water."

And of course, water is an integral part of our earth and a powerful expression of nature. Listen for rain storms in the Montrose Pavilion(!) in "Storms in Africa" and "La Lluvia."

And we tell the story of water as love. **Eric Whitacre**'s "Water Night" is a world unto itself. Based on Octavio Paz's poem, "Agua Nocturna," **Whitacre** creates a gorgeous, immersive landscape of sound. He says, "As I read the poem...the music seemed to sing itself out into the air, as if it were a part of the poetry itself." This poem has been read as an extended metaphor of water as love: cycles of love, love as a tool of transformation, love for the self



as nourishment like a "river...filling you from within," and love as a ripple outward to the world around us. The music places me in that wonderfully liminal space that I loved as a child–still, underwater in a swimming pool, feeling only water and the odd silence of that suspension of time. This piece sounds like it is being performed underwater, which is magic. I invite you to immerse yourself in the sounds and words of love spoken to you, like warm ocean waves constantly calling you to your heart.

But for many of us, especially here on the Western Slope, water is about life,

time, and season. This is why I felt strongly that we needed to sing stories of water from different seasons of life in the most literal way we can. You will see young singers (elementary and middle schoolers)



share the stage with our adult choir members. And I am certain that you will feel the exuberant joy that youth offers—a reminder of the playfulness of water. You will also see high schoolers from the wider community join the VSA Chorus to perform "Water Night." When we sing this piece together, we knit our seasons of life together. We work to build something beautiful and challenging, together. It is a shared song of journey and the love of music.

I am so swept up in the current of this chorus and what is possible in music. With a full heart, I am proud to present *WATER!*

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






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DISCOVERING OUR ROOTS Music You Love. Musicians You Know.

Volunteer orchestral and choral groups like the VSA are an outcropping from the concept of the American community band, which predates the Civil War. Immigrants brought the band tradition with them to the US, where thousands of ordinary citizens participated in these ensembles.

After the Civil War, census figures indicated that, across the country, there were about 10,000 community bands. Town bands were admired and provided townspeople with popular, light entertainment for concerts. While the quality of performance varied, the enjoyment and value to each town's social and cultural climate is undeniable.

Community bands experienced a great dying out after World War I, victims of a cultural shift to mass media, radio, and more, all which led to a rise in school music programs. The increased number of musicians who learned an instrument and played in high school and college bands but did not pursue music as a career also provided a rich pool of amateur talent seeking an outlet for their musical abilities. As a result—and ironically—there was once again a rise in participation in community bands.



DISCOVERING OUR ROOTS cont...

While there will always be music teachers and professional musicians participating in volunteer music performance groups like the VSA, most members come from professions that are not related to music. Most are amateurs who enjoyed playing in school and missed the camaraderie and music-making. Others are students looking to gain more rehearsal time and learn from more experienced musicians.


These ensembles give everyone, regardless of their age or chosen career path, a place to play their instrument, contribute to their community, and most especially, to enjoy themselves while making music.

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OUR HISTORY Music You Love. Musicians You Know.

As a rare, regional, all-volunteer performing arts organization, the VSA takes pride in their long history of bringing *music you love by musicians you know* to the Western Slope. The VSA continues to grow in membership, musical ability, audience size, and program variety, and is thought

to be the only orchestra in Colorado that is not based in a town with a college community.

Today, the VSA's 120+ regional volunteer musicians and choristers—from teenagers to 90-somethings—come together from throughout the Grand, Uncompanger, Gunnison, and North Fork Valleys to bring their skill, passion, and talent to the stage.

It all started in 1970, when a small group of classical musicians met in the parlor of Wilma and Charles Lowell's Eckert home. By October 1971, the Delta County Community Orchestra was under the baton of Walter Birkedahl of Mesa State College and first performed on March 2, 1972, at Cedaredge Hunsicker Elementary School. On March 16, 1978, the nonprofit known as the Valley Symphony Association was formed to support the orchestra. At that time, nearly 50 musicians from Montrose, Delta, Grand Junction, Ouray, Gunnison, Paonia, Hotchkiss, Cedaredge, and Eckert practiced once a week in Delta and performed four annual concerts.



OUR HISTORY CONT...

In the late 1990s and early 2000s, numerous choirs, like the Grand Mesa Singers and the Christmas in the Valley chorus, were seasonal contributors to the orchestra, mainly at Christmas concerts. In 2002, these choral groups combined and came under the VSA umbrella to create the VSA Chorus.

Since its humble beginnings, the VSA has always believed in the power of music to connect our communities through transformative live musical experiences for all generations of musicians and audiences. 






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
