

# HONORING VIVIAN CHENEY

This endowment is particularly meaningful as it honors the legacy of longtime VSA violinist and devoted teacher Vivian Cheney. Vivian, originally from Troy, Kansas, began playing violin at Kansas University and went on to a lifetime of teaching and performing. After relocating to Paonia in 1976, she joined the Valley Symphony, where she played for more than 40 years.

VIVIAN CHENEY

Vivian's story is a testament to dedication and love for music. She spent 50 years as a school teacher, sharing her gift with countless students, and often called Thursday night orchestra

rehearsals the highlight of her week. She volunteered with senior citizens, played organ at her church, and treasured her connections with fellow musicians.

In 2019, VSA proudly featured Vivian in our newsletter, celebrating her as the orchestra's longevity award recipient. At that time, she had played violin for an astounding 86 years; 43 of those with the VSA. She fondly recalled rehearsals with just two second violins, a concertmaster's dog in attendance, and the joy of performing with musicians across multiple generations.





TROY RAPER

Troy Raper is a Colorado native and has been teaching in the state since 1988. Mr. Raper received his bachelor's Degree in Music Education from the University of Northern Colorado where he graduated with Honors. Troy received his Master's degree in Education in 2006 from Lesley University with an emphasis in Educational Technology. He retired from Public Education in 2021 after 31 years in education. Troy was the Orchestra and Strings teacher at Palisade High School and Mt. Garfield Middle School in Palisade, CO.

During his long career in public education Mr. Raper's school orchestras has been consistently awarded Superior Ratings at Music festivals from Palisade to Disneyland. Many former students of his program are now accomplished professional teachers and performers around the country. While retired Troy continues to teach Private lessons for aspiring bass students in the area.

As an active advocate for teaching in Colorado, Mr. Raper spent 10 years as Chair/Board Member for the Colorado All State Orchestra Governing Board, helping to create a new charter and direction for the organization. He has also served as a board member of the Colorado Chapter of the American String Teachers Association, and as a Member of the Colorado Music Educators association state Board. Troy is currently serving as Production Manager and librarian to the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra. As a member of the musical community on the western slope Mr. Raper has spent countless hours developing and nurturing a community of former students, colleagues and professional relationships. He believes in the accessibility of music to everyone. From the youngest students to professionals there is a place for everyone in the arts. Troy has recently taken the helm of the Valley Symphony Orchestra in Montrose as their new conductor and Music Director. This all volunteer orchestra was a logical next step in developing the love of music by all under his direction.

Entering his 3rd year as the Artistic Director of the Valley Symphony Association Troy looks forward to developing the orchestra's direction for many years to come. Mr. Raper is an accomplished musician with broad performing experience. He has performed with the Greeley, Ft. Collins, Cheyenne, Durango, and Crested Butte Music Festival orchestras and sits as Principal Bassist for the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra. He performs regularly in various Jazz Bands, recording studios and as a concert soloist. Troy Raper's hobbies and personal interests include spending time with his family, wife Lori, and two adult daughters Mandolyn and Melody. Lori is an accomplished professional artist and teacher and both daughters are developing careers in the arts. He also enjoys arranging music for strings, playing and testing video games, enjoying the open road on motorcycles and remodeling projects of all kinds.

A proud Colorado native from Loveland, Nathan brings a rich background in music education and composition to the podium. He began his career teaching choir and orchestra in schools on Colorado's Eastern Plains before moving into higher education, where he helps teachers to complete master's degrees in education and gain licensure to become principals.

Nate is also an acclaimed choral composer and arranger, with works performed by all-state and American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) choirs, as well as in schools and concert venues around the world. His music is published by leading houses including Hal Leonard, Shawnee Press, and MusicSpoke.

A longtime supporter of the VSA, Nate sang with the Chorus for four seasons before taking on this leadership role. He brings a deep admiration for the extraordinary artistry that emerges when dedicated local musicians come together in a spirit of collaboration and joy.

Nate holds a bachelor of music education from the University of Northern Colorado and a master of educational leadership from Western Governors University.

Outside of music, Nate and his wife, Alli, love adventuring across the Western Slope and beyond with their four children; Phin, Eli, Adele, and Atticus.

# SANDRA SUNDSTROM

#### **CONCERTMASTER**

Sandy grew up in Colorado Springs, CO, in a family of musicians. She was involved in orchestras, choirs, and bands throughout her youth, and earned her bachelor of music in education with an instrumental major and choral minor from Arizona State University. Sandy has taught band, choir, and orchestra in all levels of education, elementary through college.

In 2010, she and her family moved to Grand Junction, and she is the Grand Junction Symphony Orchestra (GJSO) Principal Second Violinist. She also plays with High Desert Opera

and Rockestra. She has an active private studio teaching violin, viola, and cello, and her quartet performs in churches and for area events. She plays in regional gigs, performs regularly in Aspen for summer weddings, and is a recurring violin coach for Camp Con Brio. Sandy has adjudicated for the District 51 (D51) Solo/Ensemble, and local auditions, and judged the Colorado West Invitational Music Festival in 2013. She was an active member of the GJSO Board for many years and served on their music director search committee.

In 2013, she started as a paraprofessional in Mesa County School District. Sandy has assisted orchestras at several middle schools, and in 2014, she was a long-term sub for choirs at a local high school. She retired from D51 in the fall of 2023.

Sandy and her husband, Dan, have two daughters, a son, and four grandchildren. They absolutely love living in Grand Junction: the people, surrounding views, and connections they've made.

What is a concertmaster? The concertmaster is the principal or "first chair" violinist who leads the orchestra in its tuning prior to the concert and customarily plays all violin solos within pieces. As the leader of the entire string section, the concertmaster also marks the orchestra's scores with the appropriate bowings to ensure all the strings are moving and playing in unison, and translates instructions from the conductor into specific technical language for strings.



# **CLASSICS WITH A TWIST**

# FROM BACH...

Johann Sebastian Bach's
Orchestral Suite No. 2 in B
minor, BWV 1067 exemplifies the
Baroque art of blending elegant
dance forms with virtuosic display,
particularly for the flute. Though the
full suite contains eight movements,



the selected Rondeau, Bourrée I & II, Menuet, and Badinerie reveal the expressive range and charm that make this work a perennial favorite. The Rondeau (Movement II) introduces the flute in a graceful, agile solo, framed by the French rondeau form where a recurring refrain alternates with contrasting episodes; its dance-like poise is enriched by Bach's inventive counterpoint. The paired Bourrées (Movement IV) highlight lively contrasts: the first is buoyant and extroverted, while the second, in a minor mode, darkens the color with ornamented lines that suggest introspection before returning to the brightness of the opening. The Menuet (Movement VI) offers stately elegance, its lyrical flute phrases floating serenely above transparent textures, reminding us of the dance's courtly roots. Finally, the Badinerie (Movement VII) bursts forth with dazzling brilliance, its quicksilver runs and sparkling rhythm transforming what might have been a closing dance into one of the most beloved encores in the repertoire. Together, these movements balance refinement with exuberance, showcasing Bach's ability to turn familiar dances into timeless works of artistry and joy.

Richard Meyer's Ghosts of Brandenburg pays witty and affectionate tribute to Johann Sebastian Bach's beloved Brandenburg Concertos. Written for string orchestra, the work imagines the "spirits" of Bach's music reappearing in a contemporary setting, weaving fragments and stylistic echoes of the original concertos into fresh textures. Listeners will recognize Baroque-style sequences, rhythmic drive, and contrapuntal gestures, yet Meyer frames them with modern harmonies and playful twists that give the piece a spirited, almost cinematic character.

The title suggests both reverence and playfulness: Bach's presence is never far away, but Meyer treats it with a light hand, allowing today's performers to enter into dialogue with a master of the past. The result is a work that entertains and educates, celebrating the enduring vitality of Baroque music while inviting audiences to hear Bach's influence through a 21st-century lens.

# TO ROCK...

La Suerte de los Tontos (Fortune of Fools) by Johnny Richards, written in 1958 for Stan Kenton's orchestra, is a bold, Latin-infused jazz composition. Premiered in the late 1950s, it epitomized the fusion of Afro-Cuban rhythms with progressive jazz, showcasing Richards' adventurous orchestrations. Its driving percussion and brass fanfares captured the cultural blending of postwar America, sounding fresh, worldly, and modern to audiences of the time.

First performed in Rio de Janeiro in 1962, The Girl from Ipanema quickly became the most famous example of bossa nova, especially through the version popularized by Astrud Gilberto and Stan Getz. Its understated rhythms and breezy sophistication contrasted with the energy of jazz and rock, offering an international audience a new sound of elegance and cool. By the mid-1960s, the song had become a global pop symbol, earning a Grammy for Record of the Year in 1965. The Beatles reshaped the landscape of popular music with innovative harmonies, studio experiments, and genre-crossing styles. Medleys of their hits often include classics like Yesterday, Hey Jude, and Let It Be, songs that defined the cultural voice of the 1960s. Presented in orchestral or choral settings, these medleys highlight the band's sophisticated melodies and enduring influence across musical traditions.

Released in 1969 as part of Tommy, the first full-scale rock opera, Pinball Wizard showcased The Who's high-energy blend of storytelling and rock drive. Pete Townshend's songwriting elevated rock into new theatrical territory, treating it as narrative art. Arriving in the midst of the countercultural revolution, the song cemented rock's ambition to rival classical forms in scope and impact.

## **CONCERT NOTES**

Quadrophenia was The Who's 1973 double-album rock opera that told the story of a young mod navigating life in 1960s England. Its score combined hard rock power with synthesizers, orchestral textures, and sound effects, reflecting the layered complexity of youth culture. As



concept albums rose in prominence, Quadrophenia captured both the personal angst and collective rebellion of its era.

Released in 1988, Journey's Greatest Hits brought together the band's most successful songs from the late 1970s and 1980s. It remains one of the best-selling compilation albums of all time, embodying the peak of melodic rock's mass appeal. We hope our rendition can bring back, or create, great memories for you this evening.

Lin-Manuel Miranda's Hamilton premiered off-Broadway in 2015 before quickly moving to Broadway, where it transformed musical theatre. Blending hip-hop, R&B, and traditional show styles, it recast America's founding story through a modern, inclusive lens. Winning the Pulitzer Prize and 11 Tony Awards, it stands as a landmark of 21st-century stage innovation.

Composed for the 1978 film, Children of Sanchez combined symphonic sweep with Chuck Mangione's signature flugelhorn. The work won a Grammy for Best Pop Instrumental Performance, reflecting its powerful blend of jazz, pop, and cinematic scoring. Its soaring themes epitomized late-1970s fusion, captivating audiences with both melodic beauty and emotional resonance. Chuck Mangione died this July at the Age of 81. His music has always been motivational to me and I wanted to end this concert in honor of his contributions to our artform.

#### WHO ARE OUR VSA MUSICIANS & CHORUS MEMBERS

### THE TRADITION AND LOCAL LEGACY

#### OF COMMUNITY MUSIC

Since its founding in 1970, the Valley Symphony Association (VSA) has brought orchestral and choral music to audiences across Colorado's

Western Slope. What began as informal "music nights" in the home of Wilma and Charles Lowell soon grew into public performances. By 1972, the ensemble presented its first formal concert as the Delta County

Community Orchestra, and in 1978, the nonprofit VSA was established. In 2002, the addition of the Valley Symphony Chorus expanded the ensemble's offerings and strengthened its community reach.

Today, more than 125 volunteer musicians from over a dozen towns across six counties unite under one mission, to connect communities through live music.

### WHY THIS TRADITION MATTERS

Community orchestras in the U.S. carry a long and proud heritage of citizen-based music making. Amateur ensembles date back to the early 1800s, when neighbors came together purely for the love of performing. Some of the earliest examples include the Boston Phil-Harmonic Society (founded 1809) and the Handel & Haydn Society (1815), still active today.

By the late 19th century, there were an estimated 10,000 community bands across America, many founded by immigrants who brought European traditions of public performance. That spirit continues today, with more than 1,600 orchestras nationwide, many of them small, volunteer ensembles deeply connected to their local communities.



From its grassroots beginnings to a vibrant regional institution, the VSA carries this American legacy forward, bringing together teachers, farmers, students, retirees, and professionals who share a love of music, community, and the joy of performing together.

### CHORUS PROGRAM NOTES

Every conductor has a "bucket list" of pieces they hope to perform during their career. When I was selected as VSA Chorus conductor, I began considering my own list with fresh eyes. In this season where we celebrate the heritage of this organization, I went to our library for inspiration. I was heartened to see how much music from VSA's past is still relevant (and worthy of the bucket list) today.

As musicians, we get to connect with our heritage constantly. After all, our art form doesn't hang in a gallery gathering dust. We actively re-create the music of the past whenever we sing or play, and it connects us with rich traditions that span centuries.

This season, the VSA Chorus is bringing back classics and connecting them with new favorites, starting with some beautiful Broadway in our Pops in the Park performances. It's always thrilling to revisit the work of Leonard Bernstein, whose unique approach transformed both Broadway and symphonic music.

When conducting a performance shortly after the assassination of John F. Kennedy, Bernstein said, "This will be our reply to violence: to make music more intensely, more beautifully, more devotedly than ever before." In uncertain times, I often return to that vision. Music affirms our humanity and heals division.

Christmas by Candlelight has become a beloved tradition in our community. As we explore our choral heritage, we start in the Renaissance with Praetorius's Psallite, Unigenito - a carol with Latin and German texts.

For choirs, it simply doesn't seem like winter without some John Rutter. Blow, Blow, Thou Winter Wind brings a Shakespeare text to life with a soaring melody over a delicate, icy accompaniment.

In our March chorus concert, High Notes to Harmonies, we draw on the heritage of our nation, our state, and the VSA. 2026 marks the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. We celebrate with a selection of uniquely American choral music.

The musicians of today's VSA Chorus have received a profound gift from past members and directors. We're thrilled to share this heritage with our community as we look forward to bringing you meaningful and lovely music for many seasons to come.

#### THE SOUND OF CHRISTMAS

Few songs conjure holiday nostalgia quite like Irving Berlin's White Christmas, introduced in 1942 and forever associated with Bing Crosby's warm, heartfelt voice. Its wistful simplicity continues to resonate, reminding us of the longing for home and the beauty of snow falling gently outside.



No holiday season would be complete without Tchaikovsky's

Nutcracker. From the sparkle of the Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy to the grandeur of the Waltz of the Flowers, these movements exemplify the ballet's magical blend of

grace and imagination. They invite us into a dream

world of sweets, snow, and enchantment that has become synonymous with Christmas. From ballet to storybook, we turn to music from How the Grinch Stole Christmas, reminding us that the holidays are not about packages or bows, but about the love and fellowship that bring us together.



## CHRISTMAS BY CANDLELIGHT

#### **CONCERT NOTES**

The haunting beauty of the Wexford Carol, one of Ireland's oldest Christmas carols, offers timeless reflection, while Greensleeves, with soloists, recalls the richness of Renaissance song adapted to the Christmas season as "What Child Is This." Together, these works anchor us in the sacred traditions of the holiday. Samuel Coleridge-Taylor's A Christmas Overture, first published in 1925, brings a Romantic brilliance to familiar carols. Interweaving melodies like Hark! The Herald Angels Sing and God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen, Coleridge-Taylor transforms them with lush orchestration and harmonic richness, turning simple tunes into a grand celebration. His overture reminds us how holiday music, when filtered through a composer's imagination, can sound both familiar and fresh. Handel's majestic Hallelujah Chorus from Messiah remains one of the most iconic works of the season. Written in 1741 and premiered in Dublin, it has become a universal expression of triumph and joy, its ringing "Hallelujahs" lifting hearts year after year.

We close with Leroy Anderson's Sleigh Ride, perhaps the most playful and spirited holiday work in the orchestral repertoire. Its jingling bells, whinnying trumpet horse, and infectious rhythm capture the pure fun of the season, sending us out into the winter night with cheer.

From ancient carols to Broadway classics, from the sacred to the whimsical, tonight's Christmas by Candlelight embraces the full range of holiday experience. May the music bring light to the darkness, warmth to the chill, and joy to all who share in this celebration.

#### **CELEBRATING THE SOUNDS OF THE WEST**

Few landscapes have inspired composers as deeply as the American West, with its wide skies, frontier spirit, and rich folklore. Tonight's program explores this heritage through music that captures the vitality, humor, and lyricism of Western life.

John Williams' Cowboy Overture sets the stage with galloping rhythms and bold fanfares, evoking the adventure and excitement of the frontier. Carl Strommen's Prairie Song offers a gentler reflection, painting the beauty and solitude of the



plains through folk-like melodies and warm orchestration. From the Broadway stage, Rodgers & Hammerstein's Oklahoma! reminds us how the West also shaped American musical theater, blending romance, optimism, and pioneering spirit in songs that became instant classics.

Ferde Grofé's On the Trail from the Grand Canyon Suite provides a playful musical snapshot of a canyon donkey ride, complete with clip-clopping rhythms and sweeping vistas. Aaron Copland, often called the "Dean of American Music," deepened the sound of the West with his ballet scores. Excerpts from Billy the Kid (Prairie Night and Celebration) juxtapose moments of gentle lyricism with explosive energy, while the famous Hoe Down from Rodeo bursts forth with the syncopated drive of a barn dance, immortalizing folk tunes within an orchestral frame.

Bridging tradition with the present, Soon Hee Newbold's Elementa expands the evening's focus beyond the historical West to the elemental forces of nature itself. Its cinematic energy and vivid depictions of earth, water, air, and fire connect us to the enduring landscapes that continue to inspire composers today.

Together, these works celebrate not only the mythology of the cowboy and the frontier but also the broader spirit of resilience, imagination, and joy that defines American music.

Capping off this wonderful evening of music is the artistry of our guest violinist, Marie Rhines. Performing her own concerto with the orchestra, as well as sharing the stage with our musicians, she brings a unique voice that captures the spirit of the American West. Her presence ensures a finale both memorable and deeply connected to the landscapes and traditions we all know and love.

## **CANYONS TO COUNTRY**

## GUEST ARTIST: MARIE RHINES - VIOLINIST / COMPOSER



MARIE RHINES

Marie Rhines is a classically trained violinist and composer whose musical voice blends European, Americana, and Western traditions. She holds a Master of Music degree from both Yale University and the New England Conservatory and a Bachelor of Arts in History & Political Science from Northeastern and Boston University.


Raised in New England (Lexington, Boston, Vermont, Cape Cod), Rhines' fiddling repertoire encompasses Scottish reels and pipe tunes, Shetland and Irish jigs and

reels, Bluegrass, and the old-time styles of New England and Appalachia. She is the recipient of numerous ASCAP composition awards (22 in all) and a Rockefeller Grant from the American Music Center in New York.

Rhines currently makes her home in Sedona, Arizona, where she has deepened her study of cowboy/cowgirl and Western music, incorporating its history and culture into her work. As a featured soloist, she performs her own violin concertos with symphony orchestras, drawing on her fiddling roots to shape original symphonic compositions. In addition to concert performance, she leads the lecture-music program "Incredible Women of the West", regularly presented in colleges and museums.

### **OUR STORIES IN SONG**

In a year of both celebration and solemnity, we are excited to share a sampler of choral music that connects with the history of the VSA, the state of Colorado, and our nation as a whole.

In the heritage of the American choral tradition, we have borrowed from so many sources: classical traditions, communal worship from high masses. to shape-note singing, the African American spiritual



tradition, and unique ingredients from indigenous music around the world.

These are a few of the composers and arrangers featured this evening:

Randall Thompson was a monolith of American choral and orchestral music in the 20th century, and Leonard Bernstein was one of his students! Choose Something Like A Star comes from Thompson's choral suite Frostiana, written for the bicentennial of the township of Amherst, Massachusetts. The poet Robert Frost lived in Amherst for a time, and his culminating lines in this piece are profoundly relevant today: "So when at times the mob is swayed, To carry praise or blame too far, We may choose something like a star To stay our minds on and be staid."

Cecil Effinger was a Colorado composer, a former professor at the University of Colorado. His pastorales take texts from Colorado's first poet laureate, Thomas Hornsby Ferril. These works show a deep connection to Colorado's environment and people. "No Mark," is an elegy for a fallen military hero, likely a war pilot who was shot down over the ocean and never recovered. Major events often leave a mark in the space where they occur, but there is nothing to mark the place where this plane fell. Ferril closes with a wistful goodbye: "O swing away, white gull, white gull; Evening star, be beautiful."

Stephen Paulus was a modern Minnesota composer whose body of work spans everything from beginning youth choruses to the New York Philharmonic. His Pilgrim's Hymn has become a fixture of choral repertoire.

### **HIGH NOTES TO HARMONIES**

### **CONCERT NOTES**

Before Moses Hogan revived the culture of the choral spiritual in the late 20th century, William Dawson set the stage as a preeminent arranger of spirituals. His arrangements in the early part of the century set the standard. Dawson was a professor at the Tuskegee Institute for 25 years, and was a musicologist as well as a composer. He saw African American folk music as a topic for serious academic study, and his work helped to promote the singing of spirituals as a meaningful, uniquely American art form.



Dr. Andrea Ramsey is a living composer who has taught at the University of Colorado. Her work draws on her roots. A product of public education and the first in her family to attend college, Andrea grew up in rural Arkansas where she experienced firsthand the power of music to provide opportunities, a sense of community, and better understanding of our humanity.

The VSA Chorus is excited to bring the work of these composers and arrangers to life, and to connect our history with our future through this performance. Whether you have been a loyal member of our audience for years, or this is your first time joining us for a concert, you are now a part of our heritage. Thank you.




